Dec 16th Session Meeting Highlights

- Session agreed that we will serve gluten free bread for communion from now on, starting with the communion on January 4, 2015.
- Doug Seely has offered us the pump organ that

- Session agreed that the annual meeting of the congregation will be held after a new pastor has been hired, probably in February.
- New pastor: Walt asked session to review the applications received and to call the references.

- Headstart is having monthly parent meetings in the fellowship hall on the 2nd Wednesday of the month from 5:30 p.m. – 7:00 p.m.
- Laura provided a report to Session showing the number of page views that our website received in November. It showed between 0 and 18 page views per day.
- Lois Wengenroth's son has donated Lois's copy of the Bible on CD's. Session directed that the CD's be put in the library and that the congregation be informed.
- In regard to the GAP ministry through Love INC, Sally Klein prepared a suggested list of school supplies. Kim will confer with the school district and Love INC to inform them of what we intend to do and to confirm that we are "doing it right". The congregation will be asked to donate items on the list.

- Nancy Hankins set up and decorated a Christmas tree in the Sanctuary on Wednesday, Dec. 3rd.

WHAT IS A "GAP" MINISTRY?

"And I searched for a man among them who should build up the wall and stand in the gap before me for the land..". Ezekiel 22:30

Love INC serves others through a circle of "gap ministries" located in our partner churches. Within every community there are ministries and agencies that can provide material resources to those in need. However, there are always gaps in the services they provide. The ministries at the Love INC partner churches stand in those gaps and fill the needs that are missing. When the Bed, Bath and Kitchen ministry was being dedicated at the Church of Christ someone asked, "What does "gap" mean?" One of the Elders spoke up and said, "God Always Provides." I like that definition. God does always provide.

Sometimes not exactly how we expected or in the amount we expect, but it is always sufficient and often overflowing in generosity.

Reaching Beyond Barriers

Larry has been faithfully volunteering at Garfield Farm, an urban agricultural project run by the Open Door, a Presbyterian congregation in Pittsburgh, for two and a half years. Though not a Christian, he is committed to Christian values and attends worship at the Open Door. The congregation's lead pastor, B.J. Woodworth, says Larry has told him that while he appreciates Christianity, "he just can't commit (his) life to following one religion." Recently, however, he participated in Communion.

"The Spirit is moving in his life." Woodworth says. And conversations about Christianity between Larry and the pastor continue. (*Note: "Larry" is a pseudonym, used here to ensure privacy.*)

At the Open Door, much of the outreach is centered on the growing number of people who say they are "spiritual but not religious" More than one-third of the 46 million religiously unaffiliated Americans describe themselves this way, according to a 2012 study by the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life.

The Open Door seeks to cultivate that interest in spirituality along-side the crops grown at its three-acre Garfield Community Farm. "I think the millennials and gen Xers are suspicious of religion and the institutional church, but they are spiritual and they think what we're doing at our farm is spiritual," Woodworth says.

"In the postmodern context, people are searching and are open to mystery," says Ray Jones, coordinator for evangelism at the Presbyterian Mission Agency. "They don't necessarily believe in a metanarrative (like the Christian gospel) that can impact all cultures."

Reaching them, Jones says, requires building relationships and helping people see how their individual stories intersect with the gospel story.

Many social progressive non-Christians bring their love of nature to Garfield Farm. Seeds of friendship are sown as people tend vegetables, fruits, berries, herbs, honey, and chickens. Most young adults who volunteer live within five miles of the farm, and several children from the surrounding Garfield neighborhood help with the chores.

The Open Door makes much of what is raised available to the community.

As volunteers work on the farm, the Open Door seeks to connect its spirituality with biblical faith. "Care for the earth is the first commandment given in all of Scripture," Woodworth says. "We build on that and we continue to name Jesus, the Holy spirit, and God the Father—and over time they begin to make the connection.

A number of the farm volunteers attend worship at the Open Door. Every Sunday about 100 people gather in a rented building that sits where Garfield and three other Pittsburgh neighborhoods meet. By giving people permission to be an observer at one level and a participant at another," Woodworth says, the Open Door draws people to faith.
