Feb. 17th Session Meeting Highlights

- Session prepared and sent a thank you card to Paul Belz-Templeman for all he did for us during the interim time between pastors.
- Session set dates for the installation of Mark Sterling as Elder and the annual congregational meeting.
- Lucien Klein presented a draft of the annual statistical report. A motion was passed to approve the report.
- Tuesday, February 17th was Pastor Peter Blank's first day. He is looking forward to Sunday and would like to get introduced to shut-ins first and others and hopes within a month to be acquainted with everyone. He plans on being in Woodburn on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.
- Marcy reported that she met with Nora Crauthers and Rosie Brado from Love INC to discuss our Gap Ministry. Marcy has three boxes of school supplies so far. Families will bring a voucher from Love INC when they need school supplies. Their recommendation is to set a date before school starts for families to come in for supplies.
- One Great Hour of Sharing offering will be collected on Palm Sunday.
- Walt and Mark are looking for a roofing contractor. Walt will look at someone to come in and put in the basics of an irrigation system to the south side of the church. Locks on a few of the red doors need fixing. The sound system needs to be fined tuned. The Hispanic congregation cleaned up the leaves around the building. Session discussed rekeying the doors.
- Session discussed a few building use requests.
- A Canby Community Concert took place on January 23, 2015. Mark Sterling was the driver for 10 passengers, six from Senior Estates and four from our church. More members of our church have shown interest in the coming concerts so we may need a car along with the bus for the next concert.
- Our website has continued to grow, thanks to Laura. Joanne is going to wait until she has more direction before adding information to Facebook or Yelp.

- The antique organ from Woodburn's first Presbyterian Church was offered to us from the family of Lois Wengenroth. We have chosen to accept the organ as a gift from the family.
- Johanna reported on the health and home situations of several members.
- Communion was served to 28 people on February 1, 2015. Gluten free bread is served to the congregation for Communion.
- The microphones are a problem and we can't hear prayer requests and other speakers. We could possibly have Gene pass around the hand microphone.
- Kim Johnston has painted the lines on the labyrinth.
- The community garden was discussed with several ideas for people that may be interested in working on the project. A request for volunteers is on the website.
- A motion was approved to accept the Supply Pastor Covenant for a ¾ time pastor. The time allocated is 33 37 hours per week.

We have arrived. And you have given us a very warm welcome. Thank you! You have done a great job in preparing the place for our arrival.
